and self-care is admirable, and we can learn from her boundary setting. Too often the Left burns out our strongest organizers, teachers, and activists. If we wish to see a movement succeed we need to make changes in our expectations of each other. More of us need to step-up and support those who are organizing in our communities

In order for the Justice School to exist and flourish we need a core-group of parents and others who are willing to prioritize this program. As a congregation we need to nurture and feed this program if we wish for it to survive. We need to challenge ourselves to be more welcoming to families and be ready for the changes in our culture that would require. We grow internally and numerically when we exist outside of our comfort zones. Sunday mornings are a time for growth and development as well as loving community. It is okay and encouraged for us to be pushed beyond our comfort zones at times. Please make space for yourself and for us to grow. Reflect on the Akan people's (Ghana) liberation theological challenge to Descartes', "I think therefore I am", "I AM BECAUSE WE ARE; AND SINCE WE ARE THERE-FORE I AM." As we live within and beyond our individual selves we open ourselves to greater potential as a community. Please take time to connect deeply with one another. Bring someone new with you to church. Increase your volunteer time. Come in on a Thursday evening and volunteer for some of the little projects going on. Our community exists because we create it. Please take time to continue creating it.

CCB Board Meeting

The Board of Directors met on September 18, 2008. Following are highlights of the meeting.

The following board members and guests were present: David Broeg, Kevin Devine, Dick Keshishian, John MacLeod, Nancy Messom, Virginia Pratt, Jason Lydon, *Congregational Director*. <u>Congregational Director's Concerns</u>: A tenant committee composed of Betsy Gynn, Virginia Pratt, Jim Casteris and Jason Lydon has been formed to oversee matters relating to Church rentals and other related matters.

The security system has been installed as well as a push pad (code) to enter the CCB building.

The General Assembly of the Unitarian-Universalist Association (UUA) has called upon its president to establish a commission on environmental justice so as to take action to reduce waste pollution, to develop solar power, to encourage recycling, as well as pushing for fair trade and fair wage standards. It was suggested that an event to discuss "energy justice" be held on December 31 (First Night) at CCB.

<u>Financial Concerns</u>: Virginia and John met with representatives from the Arab-American Anti-Discrimination

Committee (ADC) and agreed to terms regarding ADC's back rent payments. ADC is still welcome to hold events at the Church.



The line items on the finan-

cial reports as of August 31, 2008 were briefly discussed, especially those concerning the charitable funds and investments.

<u>Various Concerns</u>: Ruediger Volk has accepted a teaching position at Roxbury Community College and subsequently resigned from the board.

Joo Young Choi, director of the Justice School, has resigned her position, effective in about two weeks. She has agreed to aid the CCB in finding a replacement. Arlington Street Church will accept the young people who wish to attend classes there. CCB will decide in the next few weeks whether or not to continue the children's program.

A committee for the presentation of the Sacco-Vanzetti Award for Social Justice has been formed consisting of Virginia Pratt, David Broeg and Kevin Devine. If interested in joining, please contact any of the above-mentioned individuals.

Kevin has urged the Church to join in an effort to defeat Question 1 concerning the repeal of the Massachusetts State Income Tax to be placed on the Novemeber ballot as a binding referendum.

The next meeting of the board will be on Thursday, October 16, 2008 at 7:15om, to which CCB members and friends are invited to attend.
