I love this quote. I know that we, at CCB, don't necessarily see ourselves "preaching the word" in the conventional sense. But doesn't each of us, in our heart of hearts, believe "I know what's best for me, my community, the world."? Might not that be "the word" we each feel called to "preach"? But then the quote goes on to say that such "preaching" calls for a minimum of a healing solidarity and a troubling justice. How do we do that?

This year CCB's Program Committee is focused, in planning Sunday services, on exploring oppression and what we can do about it. We have an exciting line-up of speakers on the topic for the Speakers Forum, described inside this Newsletter.

I am especially pleased that on November 10, our speaker will be Lisa Graustein, who has lived in Dorchester for most of her adult life and teaches at Codman Academy Charter School in Codman Square. A youth worker throughout college, Lisa went into public middle and high school teaching immediately after graduating. In addition to teaching, Lisa has run the New England regional Quaker youth group and serves as a trainer for the Beyond Diversity 101

Program. She recently completed a self-designed Masters in Education on racial justice education, with a focus on supporting white people to become more aware of their racial identity and to be more effective at interrupting racism.

The title of her presentation is "Working Through Privilege: A Process for Moving

Forward"

One of the biggest barriers to achieving racial justice in this country is white people's collective resistance to dealing with our racial identity and our role in racism. Lisa's graduate research focused on using theories of racial identity development and transformational learning to develop a process for white people to understand our racial identity and learn new ways of being. In this way, we can become more effective in interrupting racism and working for racial healing. Her presentation will be an overview of this learning process. She will share some thoughts about how it can be used to address other forms of systemic privilege.

If we find that this process might be useful for us, the Program Committee has discussed the possibility of Lisa working with us on some kind of longer-term basis, to address the difficult underlying conditions within us that collude, despite our best intentions, to maintain the status

quo.

Recognizing that our community is not entirely white, I invite people of color to attend, participate as led, and witness to our attempts to be accountable to the ideals we profess. Our only hope for achieving social justice is to stay present with each other and to struggle together. Everyone welcome!

The Hypocrisy of U.S. Policy on Syria

The U.S. Government is "shocked" at what the chemical weapons did in Syria. But, less than 10 years ago...

Fallujah, Iraq - Contamination from Depleted Uranium (DU) munitions and other military-related pollution is suspected of causing a sharp rises in congenital birth defects, cancer cases, and other illnesses throughout much of Iraq.

Many prominent doctors and scientists contend that DU contamination is also connected to the recent emergence of diseases that were not previously seen in Iraq, such as new illnesses in the kidney, lungs, and liver, as well as total immune system collapse. DU contamination may also be connected to the steep rise in leukaemia, renal, and anaemia cases, especially among children, being reported throughout many Iraqi governorates.

Toxic Environments

Dr Haddad believes there is a direct correlation between increasing cancer rates and the amount of bombings carried out by US forces in particular areas.

During 2004, the US military carried out two massive military sieges of the city of Fallujah, using large quantities of DU ammunition, as well as white phosphorous.

According to Dr Savabieasfahani, metal contaminants in war zones originate from bombs and bullets, as well as from other explosive devices. "We have all kinds of defects now, ranging from congenital heart disease to severe physical abnormalities, both in numbers you cannot imagine," Alani told Al Jazeera at her office in the hospital last year, while showing countless photos of shocking birth defects.

"In the last ten years, research has emerged that has made it quite clear that uranium is one of the most dangerous substances known to man, certainly in the form that it takes when used in these wars."

And let's recall Agent Orange between 1962 and 1972. And let's not forget two bombs dropped on Japan in 1945.
