#### "Mobilizing for Climate Justice"

December 7-18, 2009 is the United Nation's 15th Round of Climate talks know as COP 15. No one knows what COP 15 is, just like no one knew what the WTO was before Seattle. Because the talk falls near the 10th anniversary of the WTO Shutdown in Seattle it seems a great moment to honor by rebuilding a grassroot nonviolent direct action movement that can influence the Obama Administration prior to COP 15.

Rising Tide Boston is a local climate justice group that uses popular education and direct action to address the climate crisis, not just as an issue of carbon in the atmosphere, but as a symptom of colonialism, capitalism, patriarchy, and other systems of oppression.

Anthony Zuba, lead organizer of the Mass Interfaith Committee for Worker Justice, comes to the job with a background in theology. Founded in 1996, Interfaith Worker Justice educates, organizes & mobilizes the religious community nationally on issues and campaigns to improve wages, benefits & working conditions for all low-wage workers.

Zuba considers the Employee Free Choice Act one of the most important civil rights bills of our time. It would ensure that when a majority of employees in a workplace decide to form a union, they could do so without the harassment, intimidation, illegal firings & other tactics employers now use to prevent workers' free choice. Both our faith-based and secular civic traditions affirm the right of workers to form and join unions. However, corporations have launched a massive, well-funded but undemocratic campaign to fight the Act and the unionization efforts it would surely spark.

# **Thinking About Tax Resistance...**

ear friends and members... After everyone is done bailing out their basements and patching leaks from their roofs I hope we will finally usher in the warmth and beauty of spring. So much for March going out like a lamb! If anyone out there believes in deities that control the weather it would be with great appreciation for you to ask them to give pause to the rain, I know there are many bicycles in need or riding and outdoor lunch gatherings to be planned.

April brings a deadline that we are all very well aware of, April 15th, tax day! The constant cultural reminder that there are only two guarantees in life, death and taxes, is particularly ironic as the taxes paid to the US government managed to be spent on killing so many people around the world. This time of year makes me think of Cynthia Foster, one of our long-time cherished members who was a war tax resister for decades. Cynthia, collaborating with many others around the country, looked into her heart and knew that she was not willing to use her money to help fund the United States military or the cause of U.S. imperialism in any of its manifestations. Cynthia, like other tax resisters, was committed to the forward movement of peace and the action of paying her taxes directly contradicted the rest of the ways she tried to live her life.

Each year as tax season approaches I find myself scrambling in many different directions. On the one side I am trying to figure out who I can convince to fill my taxes out for me and get the most money possible back from the government. On the other side I wonder why I continue to fill out the forms that simply put more money and legitimacy into the evil that is our tax system. As a person of faith, as a Unitarian Universalist committed to revolutionary change, I by Jason Lydon, Congregational Director

fear what happens to my wholeness when I knowingly contribute to a system that is actively causing pain around the world. I appreciate the medical professional pledge of, "do no harm," a charge we would all do well to adopt. When I pay my taxes I feel like I am directly responsible for funding harm.

Certainly choosing not to pay my taxes is not enough, there is a movement to be built. But I ask the question, we all carry contradictions as human beings functioning in the world, it is inevitable, so how do we draw our individual or collective lines in the sand of what is living authentically true to our values? What contradictions can we live with and what contradictions must we resist? I love famous people, I can't get enough of People magazine, yet I oppose the capitalistic patriarchal white supremacist system that establishes rules for fame. That is a contradiction I am willing to live with. I am not sure paying even a dollar into the funding of drones that drop bombs on Pakistanis or the Israeli occupation of Palestinian land is a contradiction I can continue living with. The memory of Cynthia Foster and the work of war tax resisters today inspire me.

One of the critiques of tax resistance is that resisters are taking money from the social programs that we do support. However, as we pass health care reform that refuses to support an individuals right to have an abortion and have welfare systems that force people to choose between paying for food or the heat, I am not so sure money to the government is actually supporting authentic social programs. All the tax resisters I have known give away a giant percentage of their income to organizations and people doing the work we need in the world. So as tax day comes let us all take the time to consider the actions we are taking and struggle with our contraditions.

### **CCB Board Meeting**

*The Board of Directors met on February 17, 2010 Following are highlights of the meeting.* 

The following board members were present: David Broeg, Kevin Devine, Dick Keshishian, Jason Lydon, Nancy Messom, Matt Osborn, Virginia Pratt. Guest included: Jim Casteris

<u>Congregational Director's Concerns</u>: Two new members have signed the membership book, along with six individuals who have joined under the prisoner membership program.

Volunteers are needed as delegates to the Unitarian Universalist (UU) Urban Ministry Conference to take place at the beginning of May. More details to follow. The congregational director's ordination service is tentatively scheduled for Sunday, September 19, 2010 at CCB. A committee consisting of David Broeg, Mary Ann Cromer, Kevin Devine and John Mannheim has been formed to help prepare for the event. A budget for this event will be discussed at a later date.

The Radical Reference Collection has begun to examine the CCB archives which will eventually be transferred to Harvard University for safe keeping.

Susan Mortimer and Matt Osborn will attend a Safe Congregation Meeting conference sponsorered by the UU Massachusetts Bay District for the purpose of making congregations safer against various types of abuses.

**Financial Matters:** The Church is, at present, operating on a budget developed earlier during the fiscal year with the understanding that it may be amended by a vote of the congregation at a later date.

**Building Concerns:** The board proposed physical changes to the CCB building to comply with code and fire department requirements, inculding making the third floor toilet a handcapped facility.

**Various Concerns:** Matt Osborn will be leading a fourweek workshop -- Anti-Racist Workshop for White People, which will be open to CCB members and to the broad community. Some topics may be African-American and Latino/a related.

The Church is preparing for the commemoration of its 90th anniversary. Jason suggested creating a CD with

Dean Stevens for the event. Former pastor Bill Alberts, David Olson, Phil Zwerling and Jack Mendelssohn will be invited to attend as special guests. A couple of board members cited several recognized individuals who had spoken from the CCB pulpit over



the span of many years. They include: Howard Zinn, Noam Chomsky, Carl & Ann Braden, Scott Nearing, Frank Donner, Frederick Schumann, Edward Asner, Benigno Acquino, Dennis Brutus, Michael Meeropol, William Kunstler, and judges Margaret Burnham and Nancy Gertner. Too numerous to mention are the names of the Sacco-Vanzetti Award recipients since 1976.

The board on behalf of the CCB congregation extends its sincere condolences to Dick Crowley on the recent passing of his father.

The next meeting of the board is scheduled for Thursday, April 15th, 2010 at 7:15pm. Members and friends of the Church are invited to attend.


