May 3rd -- CENTRO PRESENTE

"Giving Voice to Immigrant Workers"

Legal Sea Foods and the Cheesecake Factory are exploiting immigrant workers! We will be joined by workers who will tell their stories of working under a contractor who withholds wages and writes bad checks while providing no benefits. These workers have teamed up with Centro Presente and Chelsea Collaborative to gain wages back and develop a campaign that empowers immigrant communities to fight back and forces employers to do right by their workers.

Established in 1981, Centro Presente is a member-driven, state-wide Latin American immigrant organization dedicated to the self-determination and self-sufficiency of the Latin American immigrant community of Massachusetts.

"A Journey toward Political Consciousness"

Church member Audrey Coulter, mother of four, will speak on "her" day about the many lives she's lived: hippie wanderer, wealthy New Orleans matron and impoverished divorcee. Abused by the court system and attorneys, she became homeless, lived in a shelter and subsidized housing, ultimately graduating university at 53! Hers is a mother's story of survival, courage and determination in the face of a society dedicated to putting up barriers to success.

"New Threat to the Constitution: Domestic Intelligence Collection"

Shahid Buttar is a civil rights lawyer, non-profit leader, independent columnist, community organizer, hip-hop m.c., singer and poet. He is the new executive director of the Bill of Rights Defense Committee, based in Northampton and dedicated to promoting, organizing & supporting a national grassroots movement to restore and protect civil liberties guaranteed by the Bill of Rights--especially those which have been compromised by "War on Terror" policies.

"Change Comes to El Salvador"

On Sunday March 15, Salvadorans headed en masse to the polls to cast their ballots for the future president; by 9:30 pm Mauricio Funes, presidential candidate of the Farabundo Mart' National Liberation Front (FMLN), pronounced himself president-elect of El Salvador -- the very first leftist head of state in the country's history.

CISPES is a nationally networked grassroots organization dedicated to supporting the Salvadoran people's struggle for self-determination and social and economic justice.

"Recession, Depression, Repression: What's in a Name?"

CCB Board Meeting

The Board of Directors met on April 16, 2009

Following are highlights of the meeting.

Congregational Director's Report: Jason met with the Unitarian-Universalist publicity person concerning outreach for CCB. The first Sunday in May may be designated as "Bring a Friend to Church Sunday".

Jason will perform his Charles River swim on June 21st, in order to bring money to the Church.

The "Robert Hillary of the Angola 3" function on April 5th was a huge success and was attended by nearly seventy people.

Twenty people have signed up for the "White People Challenging Racism Workshops" on Sundays from April 19th to May 10th at CCB.



The Church is ready to receive on-line donations; those wishing to contribute money may do so by automatically withdrawing from their bank accounts.

CCB has ordered 250 stickers to be placed on one's jacket or articles of clothing.

Financial: The Church is seeking a contract that provides more coverage for the building elevator, although the rate per hour may increase for more service demand.

Rental income of \$2,125 is owed to the Church from several groups.

Committee on Ministry: The chairperson, Nancy Messom, commented on the results of the March membership survey which revealed that the congregation approves a moment of silence and spirituality during the Sunday program. Other issues included focusing on the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, health care, the situation in Gaza, and subjects related to the economy, energy and the environment. Those surveyed also wish to concentrate only on one or two topics at a time. Ideas for events during the upcoming summer months are also welcome.

The next meeting of the board is scheduled for Thursday, May 21, 2009 at 7:15pm. Members and friends of the Church are invited to attend.

Our Goals and Objectives are three fold:

- (1) Schools: To develop programs and activities that teach and instill the values of peace and enrich the lives of young people.
- (2) Families: To assist and empower survivors of homicide victims with tools that not only rebuild their lives but also their communities; through Education, Collaboration, and Policy Advocacy.
- (3) Community: To inform and educate the public about the causes and the consequences of violence on the individual, the family and the community, while transforming the community into an environment where young people are valued by adults and by their peers the for their peacemaking efforts.

Support the Parole of Ralph Hamm

Co-author of the book "When the Prisoners Ran Walpole," an unlikely story about a group of prisoners in a maximum security prison and their struggle for self-determination Ralph Hamm is up for parole.

Ralph went to prison at the age of 17. He acknowledged his presence at the crime scene but not his culpability for all that was done.

He was given two second degree life sentences for a crime where no one died. His case is under review. Because of this, the parole board does not want to hear him for parole. Accepting responsibility for your actions is a pre-requisite for parole. Fighting your conviction is a barrier. So, at 41 years incarceration--he is facing the parole board for the third time with narrow hope for success.

Read this important book and please write a letter to the parole board supporting Ralph's parole. Ralph was and is a radical intellectual. We cannot change who he is, perhaps it is time the State hear why this is important to so many of us. The parole board address is below:
