Dear Friends,

We sincerely hope that you are hanging in, surviving and staying safe though this whirlwind of virus, political toxin, and social upheaval that so many people are living through. It's not easy for anyone. "I don't know a soul who's not been battered, don't have a friend who feels at ease. Don't know a dream that's not been shattered, or driven to its knees" (Paul Simon). Still, our hope is that Community Church will be a place of refuge and comfort for you. That our speakers, music and our history of organizing and community building is an inspiration to you. Spread the good word about CCB.

We are still down here in Copley Square, holding down the fort in our lonely building. There have been a few enormous challenges. The first floor restaurant, the church's major source of sustenance, was closed for three early months of Covid 19, then opened only for takeout. We are still in negotiation about their rental situation. We will also be saying goodbye to our beloved upstairs tenants, The Theater Offensive, who have decided to do their work with LGBTQ youth in a virtual

And then, on top of that, we got news that our forty-year-old oil-fired steam boiler was on its last legs. All summer we have been researching a replacement regimen for our heating and air conditioning system, getting estimates and researching the possibilities. It looked like given our present budget situation, it would be a very difficult installation. But we stumbled on a stimulus program run by the electric utility, Eversource, that will pay for a big portion of the cost. These are super-efficient units that provide heating and air conditioning. It looks like in a few weeks, we will be able to retire our old boiler, and for the rest of the winter, have electric heat as well as air conditioning next summer. It is almost too good to be true. But we are well advised by our engineers that this is the right thing to do, both for the planet, as well as for the pocketbook. We'll keep you posted as the project moves along. This is just the first step toward CCB being a state-of-theart model for energy efficiency in the City of Boston. It will take a long time, but we'll get there sooner than later.

We mourn the passing of Bob D'Attilio. He was our resident Sacco and Vanzetti scholar. No one knew like he did, the record of the case, every document in every archive in the city, all of the players involved, both here and in Italy. We're just finding out about the fascinating story of his mysterious life. Bob was, in recent years, very interested in our archives, and visited a number of times. In Summer 2020 we hosted his symposium on Sacco and Vanzetti. His lifetime dream was to have a casting of our Gutzon Borglum plaque erected in the North End. I hope it happens. 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

Daniel Ellsberg is an American economist, veteran, political activist, and former United States military analyst who, while employed by

the RAND Corporation, precipitated a national political controversy in 1971 when he released the Pentagon Papers, a top-secret Pentagon study of the U.S. government decision-making in relation to the Vietnam War, to The New York Times, the Washington Post and other newspapers.

Ellsberg is the author of four books: The Doomsday Machine: Confessions of a Nuclear War Planner (2017); Secrets: A Memoir of Vietnam and the Pentagon Papers (2002); Risk, Ambiguity and Decision (2001); and Papers on the War (1971). He is a Distinguished Research Fellow at the Political Economy Research Institute (PERI) at the University of Massachusetts - Amherst; a Distinguished Researcher at UMass Amherst's W.E.B. Du Bois Library; and a Senior Fellow of the Nuclear Age Peace Foundation.

The rupture of social bonds throughout American society has created a culture of despair, one where individuals and groups seek affirmation in acts of self-destruction. How do we restore those bonds? And if we cannot what will it mean for the United States and the world? • Chris Hedges, who has an M.Div. from Harvard Divinity School, is an ordained Presbyterian minister. He is also a Pulitzer-prize winning journalist for The New York Times, where he worked for fifteen years as the Middle East Bureau Chief and Balkan Bureau Chief during the war in the former Yugoslavia. He is the author of numerous New York Times best-sellers and the host of the Emmy-nominated show On Contact for RT America. He has taught at Columbia University, New York University, Princeton University and The University of Toronto. Hedges currently teaches students enrolled in the B.A. program through Rutgers University in the New Jersey prison system.

"Access and Disability Justice"

with Maria F. Cabrera & Charles G. Baldwin
Introduction by Ed Pazzanese (Families Creating Together)

Join us for a conversation on the topic of Access and Disability Justice in response to the 30th anniversary of the Americans with Disability Act of 1990 (ADA). After a history of social activism, strategic partnerships, architectural regulations, and government policies - what is Access now?

Maria F. Cabrera came to the US from Cuba at the age of 4 and lived and grew up in a caring hardworking Spanish-speaking family in the inner city of Boston. After she contracted Guillain Barre syndrome, an inflammation of the nerves in the extremities she became more aware of physical barriers not only in everyday scenarios but also at museums, theaters and other cultural institutions that her family loved to visit. During the last forty years she worked at Boston Children's Museum and Museum of Science. Maria has been on several boards including New England Museum Association (NEMA), La Alianza Hispana and Family Engagement Network. She has received many awards for her advocacy efforts including Black Church Project, Kids of All Learning Abilities, North End Against Drugs and the NEMA Excellence awards. Since retirement, she continues her advocacy through being on the board of Cultural Access New England, advancing access to cultural institutions for people with disabilities and Community Relations Liaison to Families Creating Together, an art based program for youth with disabilities.

Charles G. Baldwin is the Program Officer for the Universal Participation Initiative at the Mass Cultural Council; stewarding system change through a Disability lens. Charles was the Manager of Operations and Marketing at Wheelock Family Theatre for 15 years and is a professional theatre artist, designer, and a teacher.



"Hubert Harrison: The Struggle for Equality, 1918-1927" with Jeffrey B. Perry

This is the second volume of the biography of Hubert Harrison (1883-1927), the "Father of Harlem Radicalism. It covers his work with the Liberty League, the International Colored Unity League, and other organizations; and his editing of "The Voice," The

New Negro," Marcus Garvey's "Negro World," and "The Voice of the Negro." Special attention will be paid to his 1924 writings for "The Boston Chronicle." • *Dr. Jeffrey B. Perry* is an independent, anti-white supremacist, working class scholar. He has authored the two-volume Harrison biography and edited two other Harrison books as well as Theodore W. Allen's two-volume "The Invention of the White Race" (Verso Books). He has also placed Harrison's Papers at Columbia University and Allen's Papers as well as a portion of his own Papers (focusing on labor, "race," and class) at U-Mass Amherst.


