## "Using Water as a Weapon: Israeli Policies in the **Occupied Palestinian Territories**" with Nidal Al-Azrag



• Nidal Al-Azraq is a Palestinian refugee who was born and raised in Aida Refugee Camp in Bethlehem, the West Bank, Palestine. He earned his Bachelor's Degree with Honors from Harvard Extension School, Dean's List Academic Achievement Award, and Derek Bok Public Service Prize. He is currently working as the executive director of 1 for 3. org, a US based organization that focuses on water, food, health, and environmental work in Palestinian refugee camps in the West Bank. Al-Azraq has also contributed in the making of the documentary film, Degrees of Incarceration; and he is an award-winning author who co-authored two books, one of which won the Josephine "Scout" Wollman Fuller Award for the promotion of peace and social justice in the Middle East. Nidal is currently organizing and leading medical missions from the US to Palestine to help improve the medical system, and treatment, primarily focusing in refugee camps. As well as partnering with Tufts University establishing small labs, water testing, and treatment programs.

## "Housing Is the Cure' Toward the Human Right to Housing in 2021" with Maria Christina Blanco

Maria Christina Blanco is a former anti-foreclosure and tenant rights community organizer, and a current City Life/Vida Urbana tenant leader, who will share how working-class tenants and homeowners are confronting the housing threat by putting forward a "Housing Is the Cure" agenda. Using public health as well as human rights arguments, they are demanding a strong eviction/foreclosure moratorium at the federal level, Tenant Opportunity to Purchase at the state level, and fair multi-year collective bargaining agreements between tenant associations and landlords at the local level. Join us for a discussion on how we can be good neighbors to each other and support people keeping their homes. • Maria Christina Blanco, is a Bolivian-American mother, organizer, and health worker who has engaged in human rights and social/economic justice activism for over 25 years in Greater Boston. She currently works as Grants & Fiscal Sponsorship Manager at the Center for Economic Democracy. She serves on the Governing Board of the Boston Community Leadership Academy High School.



#### **"How COVID has Changed Education and Family Life**" with **Regina Robinson**

#### "U.S. Imperialism, the Latin American Left, and Liberation Theology" with Ben Norton

During the Donald Trump administration, top U.S. government officials repeatedly invoked the nearly 200-year-old colonial Monroe Doctrine to justify US interventions in Latin America. Even under President Joe Biden today, these aggressive imperialist poli-

cies continue in the region, which Washington has long considered to be its "backyard." Ben Norton will speak about how the US government has for decades waged a war on the Latin American left, and how this brutal campaign continues today, targeting not only the secular left, but also progressive and revolutionary Christian movements inspired by liberation theology. • Ben Norton is a journalist, writer, and filmmaker whose work focuses primarily on US foreign policy, Latin America, and media criticism. Ben is assistant editor of the investigative journalism website The Grayzone. He has reported from numerous countries, including Venezuela, Bolivia, Honduras, Colombia, and Iran. Although Ben is a US citizen, he lives in Nicaragua.

If we consider the existential threats of nuclear weapons and climate destruction as imprisoning the human family, what tools may we develop to resist the lunacy and give hope to each other and future generations? How can we keep ourselves free and reasonably happy? The example of Fr. Placid Karoly Olofsson, a survivor of 10 years in the Soviet Gulag, will be discussed. • John Bach is a longtime social justice and anti-war activist. He spent 3 years in federal prison during the American war in Vietnam. He makes his living as a house painter and is the Quaker chaplain at Harvard.

W. E. B. Du Bois often advocated on behalf of certain candidates and presidents as being more beneficial to black people. But he ended his life in exile and proclaimed that he would not vote. His transformation provides important lessons as a new pres-

ident takes office in 2021. • Margaret Kimberley is a co-founder and Editor and Senior Columnist for Black Agenda Report. She is the author of "Prejudential: Black America and the Presidents" and a contributor to the anthologies, "Killing Trayvons: An Anthology of American Violence," "In Defense of Julian Assange," and "Capitalism on a Ventilator: the Impact of COVID-19 on China and the U.S." Her work as an activist includes leadership roles in the Black Alliance for Peace and the United National Antiwar Coalition.


#### "Creativity is Ageless" with Susan Perlstein

**"Puerto Rico's Present and a Peek into Its Future**" with Amílcar Antonio Barreto

A series of economic and natural catastrophes have upended the lives of millions of Puerto Ricans, both on the home island and in Puerto Rican communities throughout the US mainland. These crises have profoundly altered the island's political landscape,

including the perennial debate over its status as a US Commonwealth, becoming a state or becoming an independent country. This talk will outline and then analyze these events and speculate about the island's future and its relationship with the US federal government. • Amilcar Antonio Barreto JD, PhD is a professor in, and chair of, the Department of Cultures, Societies & Global Studies at Northeastern University where he has taught for the past 24 years. He is the author of six books. Four of them have focused on Puerto Rico's contemporary political, cultural, and social upheavals. The most recent was "The Politics of Language in Puerto Rico Revisited" (University Press of Florida, 2020).
