





"Abolishing Prisons and Giving Life to Something New" with Rev. Jason Lydon

October 23 at 11:00 AM

The United States is the largest incarcerator in the world. This system is rooted in white supremacy and capitalism. The movement to abolish prisons is inspired by visionary leaders who know we can build something anew out of the rubble of the old. Let us spend our time reflecting on the possibilities offered by abolition.

• *Rev. Jason Lydon* is a Unitarian Universalist minister serving the Second Unitarian Church of Chicago. Jason was ordained to the ministry in 2010 by the Community Church of Boston after serving five years as the Congregational Director. Jason has spent the last two decades involved in abolitionist organizing, including founding Black and Pink, a nationally networked grassroots organization working to abolish prisons while meeting the immediate needs of LGBTQ/HIV+ people affected by the criminal legal system.

"Voices from Hebron" Monday, October 17 at 7 PM

Community Church of Boston and The Tree of Life Educational Fund present a program exploring the severe impact of the Israeli occupation on the economic vitality of the city of Hebron and the challenges of daily life for Palestinians living there. The city of Hebron has roughly 200,000 Palestinian inhabitants, the second largest Palestinian City in the West Bank after East Jerusalem. Approximately 40,000 Palestinians live in the Old City under direct Israeli control with a substantial military presence, surrounded by around 700 Jewish settlers. Another 8,000 settlers live in the settlements of Kiryat Arba and Giv'at Ha-Avot, on the outskirts of Hebron. For international visitors, including travelers on Tree of Life journeys, Hebron represents some of the most oppressive manifestations of the occupation.

Speakers will include Melissa, an American woman working for Community (formerly Christian) Peacemaker Teams; Dalia, a young Palestinian woman from Hebron, graduate of Bethlehem University, and speaker at our 2019 program; and Sadeg, a young Palestinian man who is a recent graduate in English Language and Literature from Hebron University.
